He will by no means lose his links to the theatre (he is now a life member) and we hope to see him often. His place on the committee will be taken by Adrian Bowd who has an encyclopaedic knowledge of plays and will do much to ensure that we continue to pick good ones. Adrian is an experienced director and is to direct *Time And Time Again* (his debut at Seaford) next May.

## OUR NEXT PRODUCTION - ***EQUALLY DIVIDED*** by Ronald Harwood



DENNIS PICOTT MAKES A WELCOME return to Seaford to direct this thought provoking and engaging play by renowned playwright Ronald Harwood (*The Dresser, Quartet*) as our entertaining opening production for the new year.

One cold, dull and dismal February the two Taylor sisters have been brought together, following the death of their mother, in the converted railway carriage on the south coast that was her home. The eldest, Edith (Margaret Kennedy), has been dutiful and self-sacrificing, giving up her own life to devote herself to the care of her mother, while the glamorous Renata (Sylvia Aston) has lived a life full of gratification and excess, enjoying rich husbands and partners and never wanting for anything. Now it is time to read the will and

divide their family inheritance, so that Edith can finally break free and perhaps find the happiness and freedom she so longs for. If only it was that simple.

Also thrown into this tense sibling rivalry are stolid family solicitor, Charles Mowbray (Roland Boorman) and failed actor and local antiques dealer, Fabian Hill (Alan Lade) to offer advice and the odd consoling shoulder to cry on. As Fabian says: 'There is nothing like a will for bringing out the best in people.'

The show opens on Friday 14 February 2014 and runs through to the following Saturday 22 February, with evening performances from 7.45pm and a matinee on Saturday 15 February at 2.30pm.



