Our next production, this September, is one of William Shakespeare's most popular and widely performed plays, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, directed by Tim Telford.

Come with us into the Court of Athens and its enchanting nearby forest as the magical, mystical worlds of fairies and humans collide.

Alas, the course of true love never did run smooth and the Athenian Court is no exception. Duke Theseus, while trying to plan his nuptials with the lovely Hippolyta, is called upon to pass judgement on the lives and loves of four of the young people of the city: Hermia, Demetrius, Lysander and Helena.

Meanwhile The Rude Mechanicals, a local acting troupe, are planning and rehearsing *Pyramus and Thisbe*, the play they want to stage for the Duke's forthcoming wedding. A process not helped by the domineering attitude of the 'star of the show' Nick Bottom.



At the same time deep in the forest, the king and queen of the fairies, the quarrelsome Oberon and Titania are bickering with each other and both seeking to gain the upper hand in their power struggle.

With all these intriques and complications, plus an unhealthy dose of fairy magic, what could possibly go wrong?

Since the last newsletter we have had our June production, *Boston Marriage*. Whilst

there has been plenty of positive feedback it has to be said that attendance was poor. We knew that, in presenting this very wordy and rather strange piece, we were asking a lot of our audiences who do seem to have voted with their feet. Several people expressed dissatisfaction with the choice of play and asked us to put on plays of more general appeal. This is giving us pause for thought. There have been many times in the past when having a full house was almost assumed, and many productions featured good, worthwhile and well-written plays. Certainly amongst these there have been some "pot-boilers" but perhaps we are starting to move too far in the opposite direction! It is easy to take for granted that audiences will just turn up, but we are finding now that full-house days seem long gone. It is true that re-igniting interest after the Covid months has been understandably slow, but I feel that we must respect our loyal following and not pass them over in favour of a hoped-for, different and perhaps younger audience. We are "Seaford Little Theatre" and our job, first and foremost, is to maintain our hitherto popular Seaford standing. Dorothy Stacpoole, ageing aristocrat and former model, owns a crumbling stately home and is considering her options as how best to preserve the property and its treasury of priceless contents, but without jeopardising her last few remaining years. The National Trust is an obvious strong contender, whereas using the house as a setting for what is, rather more tastefully referred to as 'an adult film', is another. The clash between these two extremes and those of the principal protagonists, is a vehicle for outrageous humour. But, as always with Bennett, there is an underlying theme of humanity which makes the shock of what the audience sees not merely palatable, but relevant in many ways to modern society, its mores and attitudes.


